What inspired Michelle Smoley, Center for Hope recovery coach, to get The Fifty to Idaho Falls? She shares her experience in her own words.


What started a crazy idea on a plane ride home turned into reality and I couldn't be prouder of our team for making it happen.


When I was at the All Rise convention last June I had the honor of watching a documentary film called *The 50*. It's about the OMCP (Offender Mentor Certification Program) and what it has done for the California prison system. After the film, the producer, along with some of the graduates/documentary participants, did a Q&A panel. The experience was humbling and impactful, to say the least.

I was able to get on an email list for any info regarding screenings for the movie. I threw out the idea of having a screening in Idaho Falls to Nancy and she immediately said, "Let's do it!" So I reached out.

As soon as I received the email confirming that the documentary was available for private party screenings, we put a plan in motion. I learned that having documentary participants attend the screening was an option.

at an ISU auditorium at University Place. All 250 seats sold out! It was an experience that touched the hearts of so many people and sparked progressive conversations and motivation. Sol and Cam were so easy to relate to and people took a powerful message home that night.


A NEW VENUE.. A WARM WELCOME!


With strong support from the Madison County Commissioners, Center for Hope launched a satellite center in Rexburg in April. In preparation for our opening, we organized a community conversation in March.

With volunteer support from VOICE Advocacy, Center for Hope reached out to police officers, correctional officers, judges, counselors, others who play pivotal roles in the lives of individuals with substance use disorders.

We also contacted local government officials, educators, community service







providers, religious leaders, and others. Listening to and learning from Madison Country residents is key to the way Center for Hope relates to any community of which we become a part.

We were enthused by the level of participation at the community conversation. Over 80 people attended. Exchanges were genuine, and we focused on identifying gaps and establishing ties to the community partners with whom we will to bridge them.

We believe that bringing people together in a nonpartisan way can generate the type of communication that reduces stigma, cultivates collaboration, and leads to mutual respect and constructive action. We're excited to play a role in the Madison County recovery community.

A Warm Welcome, continued

- Community leaders who attended the conversation recognize that Madison County is experiencing significant challenges with illicit drugs, including fentanyl.
- Increasing awareness about the services available at Center for Hope is an urgent challenge, given the residents of Madison County have not previously had easy access to resources and programs of this kind.
- The culture and demographics in Madison County are unique, in part due to the presence of BYU-Idaho.
 Understanding local dynamics and traditions will be a vital part of effectively engaging community members.
- Within the legal sector--from law enforcement to probation and parole to judicial leadership, the desire for positive change is strong. There is an openness to innovative solutions and close collaboration with recovery professionals.
- Shared interests are apparent and opportunities to collaborate are real.
